2013 Lenten Series: Gather Us In

Giver of every good and perfect gift,
we praise you for your promise to heal.
We thank you for receiving our prayers.
We ask you to fill us with your Spirit
that we might know your peace
and share your love in this broken world,
through Christ Jesus, our Savior and Lord. Amen.

Until recently, "healing" would be the last word I'd use to describe Lent. I'd have told you that it is a time of contemplation, a time of focus, a time of prayer. A time to spend less and give more, an opportunity to reflect on our struggle with sin and take a bold and honest look at how it affects our relationship with God, others, and even ourselves. I'd definitely say that it is a time where we focus on the poor work more intentionally toward ministering to people in need — both locally and worldwide. And for some unfortunate souls — especially this year when Lent starts the day before Valentine's day — the time when one gives something up, like chocolate.

If you look at all the above descriptions, however, you'll notice that the end result of all the things listed above is healing according to scripture. This is true especially in the Gospel of Luke, referred to as "physician" by tradition. Luke's writing about Jesus' healings and forgiveness of sins, for example, point to Jesus' ultimate purpose – human restoration. The point of each is to allow reconciliation for those who had been cast outside as unclean or unworthy due to sin or illness with their communities (both in society and in faith, often one and the same).

Luke's goal is to show how Jesus' ministry is specially focused on those considered outsiders to the Jewish community. After all, he is writing primarily to Gentiles – those considered outsiders and unclean by the majority of the Jewish community. Luke begins with the songs of Zachariah and Mary, recounting God's love and bias for the poor. For Luke, "poor" includes those who struggle financially, but it also refers to those who have been marginalized, outcast, or despised by the community as a whole. Luke shows Jesus as one who continually breaks the boundaries set up by religious leaders in order to show God's intent in giving us the law: that all people have loving, life-giving relationships with God (commandments 1-3) and one another (commandments 4-10). Jesus demonstrates repeatedly how the purpose of belief is to call all people to follow him in a life of faith.

This year, our Lenten focus will be on this focus of ministering to those who are often on the margins in our society and communities of faith. Each week will focus on a different ministry within our synod that seeks to bring people back into the center of our faith community. At the

end of worship – mainly because it is easier to hear – each guest will give a brief 10 to 15 minute overview of their ministry in the sanctuary. They will be available for further conversation during coffee hour at a table designated for that purpose in the fellowship hall.

Here is a schedule of who is coming and when:

- On Feb. 17, Pastor Amy Odgren, one of the assistants to the Bishop, will preach and speak to us about what the meaning of mission is.
- On Feb. 24, Barbara Solsaa will preach and speak about the ministry of Lutheran Social Services.
- On March 3, Pr. Angela Fairbanks will preach and speak about the newest ministry in our synod, "Off the Grid". Based in Ashland and Washburn, "Off the Grid" seeks to be a ministry of openness for those who desire faith but aren't comfortable with the regular church setting.
- On March 10, Pr. Tom Anderson from the Seafarers center will be here. The Seafarers
 ministry, based out of Superior and Duluth, offers a ministry of hospitality to those
 persons who work and visit our ports in Duluth and Superior. The goal of the center is
 to great, with Christian hospitality, the crews of ocean-going and freshwater ships when
 they come to the port.
- Our last preacher/speaker will be on March 17. Pr. Raime Bakken, our companion synod coordinator, will preach and speak to us about the sister congregation program between our synod and our companion synod in Malawi. She will share the stories of how this program has enriched the lives of congregations in our area and in Malawi, talk about the possibilities it offers, the life of faith among those in Malawi, and how we can be involved.

All of these ministries are ones *you* can be directly involved in. It is a healing – and a humbling experience – to hear how far-reaching the love of God is. Only Christ, who poured his own life out for all the sinners in the world – can have such an effect on such a range of people. Seeing the depth and breadth of God's love for the world, reflected through our hands and feet in this small area that makes up our synod, will allow us to experience the Jesus that Luke saw: one who never tires of searching for the lost and the hurting among us.

May you experience Christ's healing and peace this Lent and Easter, Pasto, Kustinas

Mutual Ministry Committee Re-established

A new Mutual Ministry committee was approved by the Congregational Council at their last meeting. Named to this new committee are Pastor Kristina, Howard Lehman, Cindy Knapp (council representative), Rosie Maki, Jim Rau, Dick Rewalt, and Karen Wicklund. Mutual Ministry is one of five committees specified in our constitution. Members are named jointly by the pastor and council president, and approved by the council.

Currently being used as a guide in initial discussions by the committee is a book entitled "Pastor and People, Making Mutual Ministry Work", of the Congregational Leader Series, published by Augsburg Fortress. Here is an excerpt from that book:

What's the use of having a mutual ministry committee?

While a broad vision of ministry and a healthy practice of mutuality sometimes exist informally within congregations, the congregation and its mission will also benefit from a small group of people who work intentionally and intensively in ways the congregation as a whole cannot. The mutual ministry committee can concentrate on holding mutuality and ministry in creative communication, a kind of constant interplay, so that each is always seeking the other's presence.

Healthy mutuality comes through a small-group approach that takes time to nurture and strengthen relationships within the group. Such solid relationships are necessary for the sake of the ministry that the committee will do together. Healthy mutuality is not for the sake of the members themselves, though they will also benefit from it, but primarily for the sake of the ministry and mission of the congregation.

Truly mutual ministry will be renewing for the whole congregation, including the pastor, and will be encouraging for everyone's ministry. Truly mutual ministry will not serve either the pastor or the congregation, per se, but will always focus on the mission of the congregation.

Please note: The book uses the term "Mutuality" which the author uses to reference a consistent and mutually supportive ministry by all congregational members as a ministering Christian community. Everyone is a minister in this terminology.

We look forward to the Spirit's guidance and the insights toward ministry that evolve as we meet. We also look forward to sharing those insights with the council and the congregation as a whole.


